What's To Celebrate Ron Kind?

This week Ron Kind is celebrating Social Security's 70 years. Kind calls Social Security, "One of the greatest poverty reducing programs ever created in this country, providing millions of Wisconsin workers with a guaranteed return on their investments." Kind encouraged 401k participation, as an alternative to Social Security reform and personal private retirement accounts.

"Ron Kind can celebrate the Socialist Ponzi scheme, house of cards, band-aid of the great depression if he wants but now it's a tourniquet on our future," says Gary Arneson, 3rd District GOP chairman. "If it works why is he pushing 401k's to supplement Social Security? It's because of the paltry 1.9% return on your investment. He wants you to continue to pay your FICA taxes into a system everyone knows is going bust and then save for retirement again with a 401k plan. Kind is a tax and spend liberal who wants to keep FICA taxes going to Washington so he can spend it and keep people dependent on government."

President Bush's principles for Social Security reform include no changes for those over 55, fixing Social Security permanently, no increase in payroll taxes, and voluntary personal retirement accounts that can not be taken away by the government. These accounts give younger workers a chance for a better return on their money. They could only be safely invested in a limited number of secure bond and stock-index funds, including a life cycle fund designed to protect workers from sudden market changes on the eve of their retirement. The account could be passed on to children or spouses.
